

The Word of the Lord

Stands Forever

Voice says, "Cry!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All flesh is grass, and all its beauty is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades when the breath of the LORD blows on it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever. Isaiah 40:6-8



The prophet seems to be cynical – he wonders what to preach to a people who are like grass. In Isaiah's day that was really true. They were fading away. The Assyrians had burned all the fortified cities of Judah (Isaiah 38-39). Within a hundred and fifty years the Babylonians would finish the job and the temple would be destroyed and the people sent into brutal exile.

But though the world around them and they themselves seem to be fading away, Isaiah points them and us to a holy promise – the word of God stands forever, the word spoken in our baptism, the word spoken in absolution, the promise made to the church that it would stand until the day of judgment, and the promise that Christ would be with us to the very end of the age. All these Words of God are true, still true.

This challenges the hearer. We like to think that we are in control of time and the events of this world, but it is not so. We imagine that we have created something durable. We imagine that we will last and our memories will be kept. But it is not so. It really is ephemeral, like grass and flowers. God has given us permission here to be weak, in a sense. He knows it. The people are like grass, and like the flowers of the field they wither and die and the wind blows them away. But the promises of God which he has spoken over them remain true. We will come to the day when we cannot draw that next breath. We will die. We cannot deny this truth. But that grave does not have the last word; that last word belongs to our God who will call us to life.

What a challenge for the church, the body of Christ. What a challenge for us who are the LWML. How will we reflect this truth in all we say and do? How will we meet that challenge? We will because God has the last word, "The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever."

MISSION GRANT UPDATE:

CLEF E-Reader Project- \$5,000.00 paid in full

This project funded the purchase of 32 Kindle Paperwhite E- Readers for the LCMS sister seminaries in Africa – Sierra Leone, Ghana, Togo, Benin, Republic of South Africa and Kenya. The CLEF Kindle Paperwhite can hold up to 2,000 full size books and course materials. The students receive all the CLEF books and materials for free. They are automatically downloaded to the Kindle each time the Kindle accesses the Internet. The CLEF provides continuing technical support to the student. The CLEF can also provide the institution with wireless Internet device so the students and faculty can assess the CLEF library, The CLEF can monitor the CLEF Kindles to make sure they are not used improperly. The CLEF is not seeking to replace the traditional “library” but is rather seeking to use the latest technology to provide seminaries and pastors with the best theological material available for free. The CLEF sends a qualified professor each time the Kindle is introduced to an institution. The professor teaches an introductory course using the Kindle and assists the students in learning how to use the electronic reader. The program is specifically requested by the Presidents and seminaries of our partner church bodies. This project is supported by our LCMS seminaries and our LCMS missionaries in the above listed countries.

The zone historians are encouraged to retain a copy of their minutes. To have an extra copy preserved, zone secretaries are asked to send a copy to the District Archivist-Historian also. When minutes are sent via email, document form, I am able to make a copy on acid-free paper for safe-keeping. Please help me continue to preserve the records of the LWML Iowa East District.

Earlier in Isaiah we read, in verses 1-5, "Comfort, O comfort My people," says your God. A voice is calling, clear the way for the LORD in the wilderness; make smooth in the desert a highway for our God. I have the privilege of serving both as your District Treasurer and on the planning committee for the 2018 LWML Iowa East District Convention, which is being hosted by my Mt. Pleasant Zone. I have two scripture passages in mind while writing this article: our Alive theme verse of Isaiah 40:8 and our convention theme from John 15: 16 – 17. Together they make an interesting complete picture!



Isaiah speaks of grass withering and flowers fading, while John points to our being grafted to the vine. We wither and fade in our sin, deserving nothing but death. But, we are rescued; grafted to the vine of Christ. Because of Him, we live and bear fruit!

As we start a new year and look toward the next biennium, these verses from Isaiah and John speak also to stewardship. The old year and biennium are coming to an end. keep any organization running efficiently. By practicing principles of stewardship, our (albeit imperfect) goal is always directing our time, talents and treasure (mites) toward extending His kingdom. That's the fun part of budgeting! The Word of the Lord stands forever and we are Grafted to the Vine. His plans do not fail.

What do the year and biennium ahead hold for you? For me? There are so many opportunities to serve Him in our congregations, societies and individually through mite offerings. Thanks be to God that He uses our imperfect plans, budgets and actions to accomplish so much more than we will ever know. I appreciate your prayers and your personal stewardship planning as we look forward to the coming biennium. Serve the Lord in gladness! He is in control, using you and your mighty mites to bear much fruit!



Katie Schuermann- Friday Banquet Speaker

Author Katie Schuermann’s “earthy and joyful” voice is as refreshing and invigorating as the Midwestern sunshine in which she was raised. Writing in vignettes which so perfectly suit the charm of small-town life, Schuermann’s words call to mind the warmth and realism of Montgomery’s Avonlea and Herriot’s Yorkshire countryside.

Always leaning toward the arts, Schuermann earned graduate degrees in music. Her professional experiences are as varied and eclectic as any writer’s, ranging from walking beans to singing with a Baroque orchestra to directing children’s musical theater camps. No doubt, Schuermann’s cornfield roots and curriculum vitae factor heavily in her writing, but it is her confession of faith in the Triune God that readers have come to expect and trust in her prose. 
