

The May 1 deadline will be here before we know it.

New Hope Lutheran Church, Charles City, "Start-Up Funds" - \$5,600

New Hope Lutheran Church in Charles City was formed on October 1, 2011. The congregation has been worshipping on Saturday evenings at a store front church in downtown Charles City. Comprised of 25 members, New Hope Lutheran Church has received a donation of an abandoned building and are looking to remodel this into their own facility. While the needs are great, a laptop computer and printer and an electronic church organ are vital to this congregation. There is no other LCMS church in the Charles City area, and the Lord has instructed us to "teach the nations" — a goal of the LWML.

Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca, "Retreat Experience Improvements" - \$6,000

Camp lo-Dis-E-Ca is utilized by 60-70 groups annually, as well as hundreds of summer campers. Necessary bedding and equipment wear out over time. Advancements in technology are prompting groups to have technology needs that cannot always be accommodated. An important part of Camp lo-Dis-E-Ca's mission is to serve as a retreat facility for LCMS congregations, schools and

other groups for Christ-centered teaching, fun, and relaxation. The facility is utilized annually by the LMWL IED for their fall retreat. This grant will provide for new mattresses and some bunk beds in the Alpha Lodge. Additionally, funds will be utilized to improve conference and retreat technology. The current setup and removal process is time-consuming and requires different arrangements for different groups. The location of the projector and speakers frequently make it difficult to see electronic presentations. Audio amplification is poor. Grant funds will be used to install drop down projector screens and projector mounts in both lodges, with new speakers in the Alpha Lodge dining and activity hall, and audio connection to the Fireside Room. These improvements will further the ability of Camp lo-Dis-E-Ca to serve as a high quality retreat and conference center, as the camp seeks to provide Christ-centered education, recreation, and inspiration for groups and individuals of all ages.

I look forward to giving updates in future issues on which grants have been paid.

Organizational Resources

All About Meetings – The Agenda

All meetings, large or small, need a plan, often prepared by the leader.



This plan is officially referred to as an "Agenda." The reason for such a plan is to assure all necessary parts of the meeting are included and not forgotten. Copies of the agenda should be distributed at a larger meeting, but small, intimate meetings need not have an agenda for all participants. The meeting leader should have a written Agenda for her use.

Parts of the agenda of any LWML meeting should include the following:

- 1. Call to order (this could be a "welcome" in a very informal meeting)
- Opening devotion, prayer, and/or Bible Study
- 3. Roll call (optional) at this point guests and new members could be welcomed, unless done at the welcome.
- 4. Minutes read and approved (assuming this group has a secretary who records minutes of the meeting) Note: There should be some recording of the group's actions for each meeting.
- 5. Treasurer's report If monies are involved for this particular group
- 6. Reports of officers and/or committees This is necessary if the group has officers, committees, circles, etc.
- 7. Unfinished/Old Business Any business that was not completed at a previous meeting and needs to be addressed.
- 8. New Business Any business to be addressed that has not been addressed in the past.
- 9. Announcements Upcoming events, projects, etc. that meeting members should know about.
- 10. Adjournment This may be a closing prayer or other closing for an informal meeting.

11. Program – If there is a program.

Please note that there are options for an agenda depending on the group. Most LWML meetings should also include at some point the gathering of Mites. Mites are for Missions, selected by LWML delegates at the district and national LWML conventions. All mites are forwarded to the LWML District Financial Secretary to be divided:

Seventy-Five percent (75%) are used to support the work and missions of the district LWML.

Twenty-Five percent (25%) are used to support the work and missions of the national LWML.

The list of Mission Grants supported by mites are posted on the District and LWML websites. These Missions are sometimes listed in the Quarterly or Alive newsletters as well.

Begin with prayer: Ask God to give you the ability to connect to the young women in your church. Pray in the name and power of Jesus that you would plant a seed in the hearts of these women and that the Holy Spirit would bring them to a closer relationship with God.

Re-evaluate: Family priorities and school activities will often take precedence over attendance to traditional LWML monthly meetings for young women.

Offer a Sunday morning Bible Study once

per month and use the LWML Quarterly studies. Following the Bible study, offer a mission minute, updating them on one mission of the LWML.

Give those women who cannot attend the business meetings the fast facts from the meeting in a handout, with invitation but no expectation.

Invite all women to participate in society projects in small ways. Be appreciative of any contributions.

Have compassion: Be quick to empathize and acknowledge the heavy demands on today's young women. They will appreciate your compassion.

Offer reminders: Young women are pulled in every direction and may need many meeting and event reminders. Use texting, Facebook, email, or phone calls – or all of these!

Discover passion: As signs of Christian passion and service begin to emerge from these young women who have been quenched by the Word, be ready to act. Provide loving support and guidance to their ideas. Nurture their growth in the LWML, one spoonful at a time.


