Judy	Our program theme is "Peace", so I've looked up that term in the Bible and it seems to mean many thingsor is referenced in many ways.	
<mark>Janet</mark>	That sounds interesting – what have you found that confuses you?	
Judy	First off, I started at the beginning of the Bible and the first mention of "Peace" referred to a "Peace Offering" – and the Bible says in Leviticus that there are laws for peace offerings – here in Leviticus 3:1-5 liste3 to what it says:  1 "If his offering is a sacrifice of peace offering, if he offers an animal from the herd, male or female, he shall offer it without blemish before the LORD.  2 And he shall lay his hand on the head of his offering and kill it at the entrance of the tent of meeting, and Aaron's sons the priests shall throw the blood against the sides of the altar.  3 And from the sacrifice of the peace offering, as a food offering to the LORD, What does that have to do with "Christmas Peace?" It sounds disgusting!	
Janet	Judy, the offerings were before our Lord, Jesus Christ was born. Let's sing the hymn "Prepare the Royal Highway", and maybe that will help explain	
1 Prepare the royal highway; The King of kings is near! Let every hill and valley A level road appear! Then greet the King of glory, Foretold in sacred story; Hosanna to the Lord, For he fulfills God's Word!		2 Then fling the gates wide open To greet your promised king! Your king, yet every nation Its tribute too may bring. All lands will bow before him; All Nations now adore Him! Hosanna to the Lord, For he fulfills God's Word!

	4 His is no earthly kingdom; It comes from heaven above. His rule is peace and freedom And justice, truth, and love. So let your praise be sounding For kindness so abounding: Hosanna to the Lord, For he fulfills God's Word!	
Judy	Oh, Janet, so in verse 1 – it tells us that the offering is to be without blemish in Leviticus – and that the King "foretold in sacred story" is talked about in the Old Testament – and He is an offering without blemish. This is emphasized throughout the Old Testament – I found many references to this offering	
Janet	You are right! The Old Testament tells us MANY times that Peace offerings are brought to the Lord. As we prepare for His coming, let's sing "Comfort, Comfort Ye my People"

Judy	Janet, this is sort of a sad song – but talks about Peace in the first verse. It also talks about sin and forgiveness – I guess that speaks to Jesus as well. We need to have our sins forgiven to have peace with Jesus. And then in the second verse we find that God is going to bring gladness!
Janet	Right again! This song reminds us that we need to be forgiven for our sins and that Jesus forgives us because of what He has done on the cross. Isaiah in chapeter 9 verse 6 tells us Jesus is the Prince of Peace!

Judy (look up)	Let me seeit says -"For to us a child is born, to us va son is given; wand the government shall be xupon4 his shoulder, and his name shall be called5 Wonderful yCounselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.
Janet	And that child that Isaiah was talking about was Jesus – the "Prince of Peace". Let's sing about his birth in the song "O Little Town of Bethlehem!
